Several new books have been added to the library. *Disarmed* by Marshall V. King was donated by Janice Cunningham. It is a biography of Michael "MJ" Sharp and his radical commitment to peacemaking. He was a modern Mennonite who moved to Germany after college, where he persuaded soldiers to choose peace and step away from the military's violent systems. He was working for the United Nations Group of Experts in the Democratic Republic

of Congo when he and his colleague Zaida Catalan were murdered, likely assassinated by those with government ties.

Let Us Adore Him by W.A. Poovey, is a drama for Advent, Christmas, and Epiphany. It explores the Christmas season in various ways. Two are biblical in setting, one is a fantasy, and the others aim at realism in contemporary life. Faith Still Moves Mountains by Harris Faulkner was given in memory of Phyllis Walters by the Rebekah/Esther Circle. This is a book about prayer and how God helps us in our daily lives. This is a collection of powerful truelife stories of resilience, healing, rescue, and protection by FOX News anchor and author Harris Faulkner.

These Things Are True By Pastor Kevin Reed



"Trust in the Lord with all your heart and lean not on your own understanding; in all your ways submit to him, and he will make your paths straight." Proverbs 3:5-6

There are three things I have always found true in life. First, there is always trouble in the world if you look hard enough. Second, there is always joy in the world if you look hard enough. No matter what happens there will always be something you can stress about and worry about. And we as humans are very good at it. We like to find the things that can go wrong, and we like to worry about what will happen when they happen, which they rarely do ... at least not our worst version of it.

I love examining the Bible people of the Old Testament because they have so many things go wrong in their lives, and it is not unusual that they help cause most of that trouble. The story of Joseph is one disaster after another, punctuated by brief moments of relief. Abraham is a big liar when it comes to his wife Sarai, and it goes horribly wrong. Twice. Adam and Eve bring sin into the world through one very poorly thought out choice. And as we have been learning in the life of Moses, he loses a lot. There is always trouble nearby if we look for it, and some of it will find us even if we do not.

It is also true that there is quite a bit of joy in the lives of the people of scripture. They find moments of great celebration. There are births and opportunities that arise from the ashes and struggle. They find purpose in their lives. They have families who love them most of the time. Moses is blessed by being included in two families that adopt him when he should be dead instead. There is always joy nearby, as well.

It is in this moment I should transition into a greeting card and throw out some trite phrase like, "Seek out the joy, and embrace the best of life." *Gag*. The hackneyed phrases and tired faux wisdom merely props

up a crazy idea that our lives should focus on our happiness. It makes it sound like it is the center of who we are, and should be, and our personal feelings on life. However, all of that is empty and meaningless because we miss the third thing that I have always found true in life.

Third, the joy is found most reliably when sticking close to and relying on God. Adam and Eve sin; God provides coverings and prevents them from eating the fruit that will permanently keep them in a fallen state. Joseph gets sold into slavery; God elevates him to second in command of Egypt. Ruth and Naomi experience the loss of their husbands; God gives them a safe place and blesses them in the ancestral line of the Messiah. Moses finds God in burning bushes, water locked in rocks, and pillars of fire and cloud. If we want to know the joy, then we could benefit from leaning into God's constant presence and understanding of the world.

The trouble will come, but we weather the trouble in the shelter of God. It reminds me of the hymn: "Rock of ages, cleft for me, let me hide myself in thee."

Indiana United Methodist Church History The Robertson Meeting House

The Indiana Conference Commission on Archives and History is responsible for Indiana UMC history and records. The commission works closely with the archivist at DePauw where UMC history is housed. One of the Commission's current projects is maintaining the Robertson Meeting House. The Robertson Meeting

House, formerly called "Old Bethel," built in 1807, is the oldest United Methodist church still standing in Indiana. It is presently located on the grounds of Camp Rivervale, a UMC camp, near Mitchell, Indiana.

However, this little log church, only twenty by thirty feet, was moved around southern Indiana before ending at Rivervale in 1999. The church was built for Nathan Robertson on his farm north of Charlestown. (Charleston is by the Ohio River near Jeffersonville). The building is built of hand-hewed poplar logs, clapboard roof and puncheon floor (the floorboards were split from virgin yellow poplar trees and hand-hewed to a fairly uniform thickness). It has had an interesting life. It served as a church for the first half-century. In 1857 it was moved and put to use as a barn for sheep and oxen. After the building was moved several more times, for a while even residing in Charlestown, it was moved to the DePauw University campus around 1899. While at DePauw, it underwent extensive restoration in 1904. However, it lacked regular maintenance and in 1999 it found its permanent home at Camp Rivervale.

Over the years maintenance has been sporadic and interrupted a number of times but beginning several years ago its care was taken over by the Commission on Archives and History. The commission has a small budget and some funds invested from gifts. Resources are limited but the commission has been able to keep the building and grounds in good repair.
