Our Church Looks forward to 150 Years

Soon Nappanee will be celebrating 150 years. Our Nappanee United Methodist Church will also celebrate those years. The Nappanee United Methodist Church traces its local heritage to three congregations— Methodist Episcopal (1874), United Brethren in Christ (1874) and Evangelical Association (1891).

Near the end of 1873, a group of Methodists began meeting to discuss organizing a Methodist Church in Nappanee. In 1874, they began holding Sunday School and prayer meetings in various Nappanee locations. The first meetings were in the homes of members. Soon the meetings grew too large for homes and they began rotating between the Hartman Hall on South Main Street, the Nappanee Elementary School on North Main Street and the Church of the Brethren on East Market Street. When the United Brethren in Christ building was completed in 1875 they began holding their worship services in that building. A Methodist Episcopal pastor was assigned in 1877 and the congregation continued meeting in the United Brethren in Christ church building until 1887 when the ME church building at 301 East Market was completed.

In 1874, the Locke Circuit of the United Brethren in Christ began meeting with the plan to establish a church in Nappanee. The United Brethren in Christ church is part of the United Methodist church heritage. The early church program consisted of Sunday School and prayer meetings in various locations in Nappanee. The meetings were generally at the Nappanee Elementary School on North Main Street They also met at the homes of members. The members soon realized the importance of establishing a permanent church home and property at the corner of South Elm Street and East Market Street was purchased. In 1875 a one-room wood-frame church building was begun at 201 East Market Street and worship services began. Their first United Brethren in Christ pastor was assigned in 1876. According to local history, the United Brethren in Christ church building was the first church building built in Nappanee.

4. Rather than including the money for shipping (\$10.00) in the box, just put it in your offering envelope, noting that it is for the shoebox project. The church will then send a check for all money received.

5. Attach an *adhesive* label indicating the age and gender of the child you made the box for. These labels are found on the table.

6. Personalize your box with a note or a picture of you or your family. Also, there are papers available on the table to complete to tell them about yourself. That way they will know that you are a 'real' person that cares about them.

7. Bring your box to church by Sunday, November 12th, so they can be taken to the collection church.

OR----Use the 'Build a Shoebox Online' option. You can send the Gospel to a child somewhere in the world if you don't have time to shop or if shopping is difficult. Go to the Nappanee UMC webpage and click on the shoebox image. Or you can go to the church's Facebook page. Either way will take you to the Nappanee goal page so that it is in included in our total. This is the easiest option and maybe the least expensive. For \$25.00, your box will be filled with quality items and includes the shipping fee. If you would like some help, talk to me about it and I will make one on-line for you.

Our church's goal is 45 actual shoeboxes and 30 online. That doesn't mean we can't make a lot more. Remember that each box has ETERNAL value – that's the one you're prayerfully preparing. Pray that through your box a child will learn about "God's Greatest Gift," Jesus.

Financial Report



The month of September provided additional cost savings due to the Pastor insurance and pension not being

paid for our interim. Offerings were even with last year's September. Discussions have centered on our Stewardship Campaign in November and our budget for 2024. You will soon find your 2024 offering envelopes in your mailbox at church – with the delay last year until Spring...we made sure to order them extra early to ensure timely arrival!

The last quarter of the year traditionally brings strong months of offering. We need to finish the year strong to enter 2024 with a foundation of financial sustainability. I am so proud of what we have accomplished as a congregation and look forward to 2024 with optimism.

As of September 30, 2024: Offerings are up \$17,424 ~ 9.8% (YTD \$194,500) Expenses are down \$14,574 ~ 7.1% (YTD \$190,425)
